I Logline

Two best friends taking on life's ultimate adventure.

They say love knows no bleeping boundaries.

II Short Synopsis

LuLu is unlike anyone you've ever met. A hard-living, chain-smoking rebel with a tender heart. A poet with a potty mouth. Farm girl. Former cheerleader. World-class cancer researcher. Beloved professor. Dr. Louise Nutter, or LuLu has just discovered a new anti-cancer drug when she finds out she is dying of breast cancer herself at 42. Shot during those last 15 months of LuLu's life, *The LuLu Sessions* is a raw, intimate, yet surprisingly humorous story about the filmmaker showing up for her best friend, and together, testing the limits of their bond while taking on life's ultimate adventure.

III Synopsis

LuLu is unlike anyone you'll ever meet.

LuLu gathers friends like a dog gathers fleas. Meet her for a Bud Lite, and you'll end up snorting beer through your nose, swaying to the jukebox, feeling the inner rebel in you bubbling up. Her cussing puts sailors to shame. She inhales Marlboros like an unsupervised six-year-old devours M&Ms. She downs Double White Russians and Dewar's straight up.

You wouldn't guess LuLu, or Dr. Louise Nutter, discovered a groundbreaking antibiotic /anti-cancer drug, the kind of achievement that wins you a Nobel Prize. Or that she started college when she was 15, whizzed through grad school and got her Ph.D in biochem in 3-1/2 years.

She's a pioneering cancer scientist. Demanding and beloved professor. Amateur poet and novelist. A farm girl. Former cheerleader. Her nicknames include "The Bull" and



"Passion Pot." At her prime at age 42, LuLu gets a phone call: She has end-stage breast cancer. She'll die 15 months later.

Shot during those last 15 months of LuLu's life, *The LuLu Sessions* is a raw, intimate, yet surprisingly humorous story about the filmmaker showing up for her best friend, and together, testing the limits of their bond while taking on life's ultimate adventure – death.

Despite all of her knowing and bravado, LuLu's last months are filled with the unexpected. At last, she's forced to admit her frailties and limitations. A retreat to her childhood farm in Vermont to seek stability and solace explodes into a confrontation with resurrected ghosts. Dying becomes a surprising process of shedding - old presumptions, values and ties and urgently adopting different ones. The quiet and arduous work of making peace in her life has only just begun.

Forcefully vocal and deeply reflective, LuLu makes this last journey accessible and heartfelt in a way that has rarely been seen on screen.

IV Director's Statement

I've been called brave twice in my life. The first time, I left a comfortable, cushy lawyer job and followed my dream of becoming a filmmaker. The second time is after people watch this film.

I certainly never set out to be brave. In the first instance, I was propelled by naivete and a freakish tolerance for uncertainty. In the second, I found myself with footage of the most profound experience of my life. While I had a sense that my story will resonate with others, the biggest hurdle turned out to be me.

Personal documentaries are for some reason, suspect. As Doug Block, one of my heroes in the genre cautions in his Rule Number One on personal doc filmmaking - be prepared to answer: "who the fuck are you to be putting your life up there on screen?!?" It took me seven years to get over myself, and decided that despite humiliation and ridicule lurking ahead, this is a story I had to share. Nonetheless, by the time I started to edit this film, I was still kicking and screaming. Just ask my editor.

Ten years ago, LuLu was my best friend and my ex-something — it's still hard to say exactly what she was to me. LuLu was like no one you've ever met. A hard-living, chainsmoking rebel with a tender heart. A farm girl, a former cheerleader and a master of profanity. A world-class cancer researcher and beloved professor. LuLu — Dr. Louise Nutter — had just discovered a new anti-cancer drug when she found out she was dying of breast cancer herself at 42. Shot during the last 15 months of LuLu's life, *The LuLu Sessions* is a raw, intimate, at times humorous story about me showing up for her, and both of us together, testing the limits of our bond while taking on life's end.

I wasn't even supposed to be there. I had just started film school in New York. I was



headed to shoot a friend's wedding in San Francisco when LuLu asked me to stop in Minneapolis and go with her to her biopsy. When the bride got cold feet and cancelled the wedding, I ended up staying with LuLu's and started filming. I caught the moment the oncologist told LuLu her cancer was malignant. Just like that I was in the thick of a crisis, and the footage I'd just shot became the opening sequence of the film.

The next 15 months - LuLu's last - became an adventure that rattled her assumptions and values and shined a spotlight on the bond between LuLu and me, and its boundaries. Our friendship and our intimacy continued to morph to uncharted places. Later, when Lulu returned to her family farm in Vermont for stability and solace, she had to battle resurrected ghosts instead. Dying became a process of shedding long-held but stale presumptions, obligations and relationships and forging new ones.

In The LuLu Sessions, I've tried to explore the transformations that death can hasten. Shooting in the style of cinema verite, I was at once the filmmaker and a character. We tried to live life "normally," but hardly any of it was normal. The camera became the watchful third pair of eyes, chronicling our characters and our frailties. It exposed us in ways that are uncomfortable and punishing.

In a culture where death equals failure and is talked about in hushed voices, dying remains deeply private and involuntary – often lonely and frightening. This experience with LuLu has made it less frightening for me, and made me keenly aware of the unfinished business in my own life. I hope The LuLu Sessions helps change our perceptions and sparks loud, passionate dialogues. I hope you use this film as an impetus to start your own no holds barred "turkey talks" with someone you love. Tell them you love them. Tell them you forgive them. Tell them thank you. Just tell them!

Ten years in the making, The LuLu Sessions is finally making its way through the film festival circuit. This film is my testimony about the sometimes annoying tenacity of love and our surprising capacity for pushing past limits - in love, friendship, forgiveness and life itself, in the face of impending mortality. This film is one of the first ever personal documentaries seen through the lens of a Chinese American, queer woman. Yet, at its heart, I believe LuLu binds audiences - straight or gay, Asian or not, man or woman, young or old - to the most universal of stories, that of love and death.

I hope this modern day "Thelma and Louise" meets "Tuesdays with Morrie", will prod all of us to wonder what our own final adventure will look like, and with whom we will we share this last ride.



V Director's / Producers' Bio

S. CASPER WONG

Director, Producer, Writer, Cinematographer

S. Casper Wong is a New York based writer, director and producer of both narrative and documentary films. Her narrative feature screenplay, *OO* 1, a sci-fi love story has won the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation Screenwriting Grant; the Grand Jury Prize for Best Screenplay at Urbanworld Film Festival and the Sloan Fellowship at the Hamptons International Film Festival Screenwriter's Lab and is slated for production in China winter 2012. Her award-winning narrative short film, *Shirts & Skins*, had been screened internationally and was licensed to the Independent Film Channel for national broadcast from 2004 to 2007. It is now part of the Tribeca Film Institute's curated Reframe Collection. Her screenplay, *Lucy in the Sky*, a feature animation space adventure, an Alfred P. Sloan Finalist, is in development.

She has served as Executive Producer for Roger Corman's first co-production in China, and is attached to direct his second co-production. Also in production is *Staying Well*, a feature documentary on Integrative East-West Medicine and the global health crisis. This collaboration with UCLA, is also being developed as a three-part television series. In post-production, is Becoming, a longitudinal documentary of Chinese adoptees in contemporary American families. The project began in 1999 when the subjects were three-years old. They were revisited in 2009 as they entered adolescence.

Prior to receiving her MFA in Film Directing from NYU, Tisch School of the Arts, she was Senior Attorney for IBM, specializing in international intellectual property and antitrust law. Casper also holds a J.D. from New York Law School and a B.S. in Bio-medical Engineering from Columbia University. She is a reiki master and an award-winning cartoonist. The LuLu Sessions marks her feature documentary debut.

LAURA MINNEAR

Editor, Co-writer, Co-producer

Laura is an award-winning editor and producer who began her work in documentaries for series such as PBS-Frontline, Nova and The History Channel, after a diverse background in field biology/zoology, fine arts and one of her great passions, dance. Her recent credits include GIRL WITH BLACK BALLOONS (editor, co-producer), which premiered at the Edinburgh International Film Festival 2010 to sold out screenings, and was named one of the "Best of the Fest". Directed by Corinne Van der Borch it tells the story of one of New York's last true eccentrics, an undiscovered 87 year-old artist named Bettina who's lived in the Chelsea Hotel for 40 years. BLAST! (co-editor) with director Paul Devlin premiered at Hot Docs 2009 and on BBC Storyville, and continues to air internationally and on PBS. She is currently a producer/editor for Dan Rather Reports and was recently honored



as the first person to win two Front Page awards in the same year from the Newswomen's Club of New York. The stories we tell, whether on-screen or in how we choose to live our daily lives, still seem to her to be about the dance.
